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Prove It!

"that in the ages to come He might shew the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus" (Ephesians 2:7).

The state of Missouri is known as the "Show Me" state. Because it is possible for a person to boast (i.e., to exaggerate the truth) and to lie (i.e., to completely misrepresent the truth), a wise listener does not indiscriminately believe everything he hears. The bigger the claim the wiser it is to have a bigger dose of healthy skepticism.

Anyone at any time can claim anything. Therefore, "prove it" is a wise course of action when you feel skeptical about another's word.

Not only is this true in secular matters, it is equally applicable in the spiritual realm. Biblical faith is not "believing something you know ain't so" (Mark Twain); it is confidence in God's word based upon trustworthy evidence (2 Timothy 1:12). The apostle Thomas was not confronted by the living Christ because he sought physical proof of Jesus' resurrection; his faith was flawed because he refused to believe the testimony of reliable evewitnesses who had seen the physical evidence (John 20:24-29).

The Bible makes many stupendous claims. Two of its greatest claims concern God's love and God's

grace.

"God so loved the world" is not an idle boast or a boldfaced lie, because the middle cross at Golgotha proves the width, length, depth, and height of God's love. It is an infallible proof, an inerasable demonstration of the Bible's stupendous claim (Romans 5:8).

The same is true about the Bible's stupendous claim of the exceeding riches of God's grace. The regeneration of a sinner dead in his/her trespasses and sins, then the adoption of this former criminal into God's family where he/she enjoys every spiritual blessing are an infallible proof, an inerasable demonstration of the exceeding riches of God's grace.

The church—the body of Christ—is enduring evidence that God is willing, ready, and able to forgive.

Ignoring this proof does not change or remove the evidence. It only proves the absence of an honest and good heart.

Good for Nothing John Chowning

"For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10).

According to God's predetermined plan, every Christian ought to be good for nothing.

Clearly, His plan is NOT that His children be of no practical value to Him or humanity. Light and salt are essential in this world; therefore, a righteous disciple of Jesus is of great profit to a spiritually dark and decaying world (Matthew 5:13-16).

To be like Christ—"who went about doing good" (Acts 10:38), His disciple must be zealous for good works (Titus 2:14), rich in good works (1 Timothy 6:18), and learn to carefully maintain good works (Titus 3:8, 14).

The motives for such goodness are enormously important:

- Good works are to be done to glorify God (Matthew 5:16), not receive the praise (Matthew 6:1).
- They are to please God, not produce self-satisfaction.
- They are to help those who can never repay you, not ingratiate you to those who can (Luke 14:12-14).
- Good works fulfill the possibility of imitating God; they cannot possibly place God in your debt through some imaginary accumulation of spiritual extra credit.

A good-for-nothing child of God does good for no other reason than it is the right thing to do. It is a high and holy calling.

Can it truthfully be said you are good for nothing?
